

## Pastor's Note

As we say goodbye to 2021 and welcome in 2022, hopeful for what it may bring, our thoughts often turn to what changes we need to make. Some of us make New Year's resolutions, resolving to eat better, exercise more, lose weight, or we attempt to quit some destructive habit. Have you made a resolution?



Unfortunately, something like 80% of our resolutions fail. Many of us will have fallen off the wagon and back into old habits by Valentine's Day. Our resolutions fail for a variety of reasons. Often resolutions are too broad, with an ill-defined plan of action. Most often, we fail because we try to make changes to our lives on our own, without community to support us, or hold us accountable to our commitments.

But there is something good about New Year's resolutions. It is our attempt to press into a healthier lifestyle and better habits. In Christian Spirituality, this is like repentance. Repentance is more than just remorse for our bad behavior, but it is the resolve to make changes. It is making an about-face, from the direction we are headed, and it is a determination to live differently. John the Baptizer baptized the people into a baptism of repentance. Jesus himself began his early ministry calling his would-be-followers to repentance, "Repent for the Kingdom of Heaven is at hand!" (Matthew 3:2).

Jesus came to transform the way we live and act. We will not get very far in the way of Jesus before we ourselves are called to repentance. But I wonder, does 80% of our attempts to repent fail, the way New Years' resolutions often fail? Perhaps. Like with New Year's resolutions, we often repent in *general* without a clear plan. What sort of changes should we make to our daily routines? What wrongs need to be made right by us? What reparations are required of us? How ought we to live instead? How can we support one another?

The Christian story tells us that real life change is possible because we don't do it alone. The Spirit of Christ is at work in each of us, convicting us of sin and calling us to repentance (John 16:8). And that our daily devotional practices, gives us a deeper sense of the life God is calling us to. "Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your minds, so that you may discern what is the will of God—what is good and acceptable and perfect." (Romans 12:2, NRSV) And the community we call church is a resource for us as we each seek to follow Christ's call together.

My hope for us as a church in 2022 is that we support one another in our quest to live out the spirituality of Jesus: loving God with all our heart, soul and strength and loving our neighbor as ourselves. This may require some self-examination on our part, and it will require us to lean on one another as we make specific changes to our lives which will allow us to love God and others more fully. But together we can press into the sort of lifestyle-transformation Jesus is calling us toward. *Happy New Year!*

### Human Relations Day Special Offering - January 16

On Human Relations Day, we participate with other UMC congregations in a special offering to support neighborhood ministries through Community Developers, community advocacy through United Methodist Voluntary Services and work with at-risk youth through the Youth Offender Rehabilitation Program. Our gifts work together for the common good, building community and sharing God's love. The Human Relations Day offering supports programs like those started in New York City during the COVID-19 pandemic for churches to provide food to their neighbors.

For example, First United Methodist Church in Flushing, Queens, NY, a predominantly Korean congregation with the Rev. Chongho James Kim as senior pastor, started outreach into the community by making a thousand cotton masks. Mina Yoo, the English language minister for the church, says that small act, distributing to senior home residences, nursing homes and family shelters beyond the Korean community, sparked a good energy in the congregation.

Members decided to share whatever they could to help day laborers with no work – one family bringing 100 bags of rice and another 100 frozen chickens to

distribute 100 bags of food one day a week. Those first weeks they distributed food to about 50 Korean families, but also to 100 mostly Hispanic families in the community. Later, an influx of Chinese families lengthened the line.

First UMC continues to serve 250-300 people each week. The congregation is dreaming of future projects, like a food coop that will not only supply fresh food but also job training and nutritional education for the whole community.

We know how systemic inequality affects those most vulnerable. When neighbors experience poverty and live in communities that have limited access to resources, as a denomination, our gifts on Human Relations Day work together to empower faith-based volunteer programs, community developers and programs that work with at-risk teens.

- Work on special events and services such as Christmas Eve, Holy Week, etc.

## **Pastor's Discretionary Fund**

#### What is this fund?

- It is a fund used by the pastor to assist people in our community and our congregation with emergency needs not provided by other sources. We often partner with community services such as Klamath Basin Behavioral Health and Lutheran Community Services.
- Checks are made out to the business rather than the person requesting funds; i.e., Avista Utilities.

### How is it funded?

- It is funded through our birthday offerings and special donations, outside of our operating budget.

### **PALM Dinners Served**

PALM (Provide A Loving Meal) is a free dinner every Tuesday and Sunday from 5:00 to 6:30. It is located in the Fellowship Hall of the First United Methodist Church, which is the lower level door closest to 9<sup>th</sup> and High Streets.

PALM is a volunteer program. It is funded by your donations. The Klamath Falls First United Methodist Church provides the Fellowship Hall, some maintenance, and utilities.

PALM provides from 85 to 257 plates of food each meal. Families, neighborhood residents, and even people who simply want the social interaction of a meal come in. Most people walk.

Volunteers from the Methodist Church, colleges, other churches, and many others come together to help.

Please come and visit, eat, help in the kitchen, or donate.

## Financial Report

### **MEMBERS and FRIENDS**

December 2021 has closed. All bills and taxes have been paid. The monthly payroll was made. Operating income for the month totaled \$9,434.17. Operating expenses totaled \$10,481.05. Income lagged expenses by \$1,046.88. Operating expenses included: a payout of \$3,600.00 for local missions including: BOOTLEG FIRE VICTIMS (\$350.00), GIRL SCOUTS (\$150.00), KLAMATH/LAKE COUNTY FOOD BANK (\$1,100.00), CASA (\$400.00), KLAMATH CRISIS CENTER (\$400.00), INTEGRAL YOUTH SERVICES (\$400.00), YMCA (\$400.00), DISABLED AMERICAN VETS (\$400.00) , and a budgeted payment of \$875.00 for Conference Apportionments. We have now completed our apportionment payments for 2021, totaling \$13,525.00. The 2022 payments have been reduced and will total: \$12,422.00.

As we enter January 2022 we have an Operating Fund balance of \$140,576.88. However, a portion of these monies are contained in outside or side pocket funds which have nothing to do with budgeted operating monies. As of the first of January, six (6) such funds existed. The funds and their respective balances:

Youth Group: \$576.86 Organ: \$4,348.51 PALM dinners: \$12,292.24

Camperships: \$150.00 Memorial Fund: \$14,505.47

**Special Needs Fund: \$45,645.20\*** 

After subtracting out the total of the 6 funds (\$77,518.28) there is a carryover to January 2022 of actual OPERATING monies totaling \$63, 058.60. Financially, for the near term outlook (2-5 years), we are in a weak position, treading water at best. We entered 2021 with a carryover from 2020 totaling \$80,643.40. At the end of 12 months, the carryover has eroded \$17, 584.80. This means that, ON AVERAGE for the year 2021, our spending has exceeded our income by \$1,465.40 per month, each month. In other words, we operated at a deficit during 2021 and 2022 will most likely be no different. The only reason we can "make do" is because of the previous generosity of a church member who has contributed large gifts which resulted in a high level of carryover during each of the last three (3) years. Financially speaking, however, our long term outlook (5-10 years) is troubling.

As of January 2022 the Capital (Trustee) Fund Balance is \$3,965.66. A monthly payment of \$200.00 was made to Libby Security Services. This completes our 12 month contractual obligation for security services. We will now "test the waters" and see whether or not it will be necessary to resume such service.


