Lenten Worship Series

"Good Enough"

From Worship Design Studio

Pastor's Note

"Are you giving up anything for Lent?"

Traditionally, the season of Lent has been a time fasting as we prepare for Holy Week and Easter. But why give something up? Why fast at all? Does God like you better if you fast from something? Are you more holy? Is God more likely to listen to your prayers if you do not eat chocolate for six weeks?

Fasting is a spiritual discipline which Christians have practiced for the past 2,000 years; however, often people practiced fasting in ways which were unhealthy, both physically and spiritually. No, giving up food does not make God like you more, you are already *good enough*. God is not impressed by our heroic self-discipline, and it does not move God to be more attentive to us.

New Testament scholar Scot McKnight says, "Fasting is a person's whole body, natural response to life's sacred moments." We fast as a response to the things God is doing or has done in our lives. It is a way of bringing our whole self to God. During Lent, we fast so we can attend more fully to the reality of the cross and the glory of resurrection as we prepare for Easter. So, if we give up something, such as food or beverage, social media, or another habit, the purpose is not so much to change that part of our life, as it is to cultivate our awareness of God in this season. We choose for a time to not do something so that we may give our attention to what Christ has done for us in his death and resurrection instead.

Fasting, done right is a type of self-care. If you have medical issues, you should not give up anything, or fast in anyway which would compromise your health. But I would encourage us to explore if there is something we can give up which will help us mark this time as sacred. Is there a food or practice we use habitually as a life-coping mechanism? Perhaps consider giving that one thing up (you can cheat on Sundays) and when you feel a craving towards it, let God's Spirit call you to prayer. In past Lenten seasons, I have given up meat and used the season to think about our food systems and injustice. This year I plan to give up snacking.

Or consider doing the Wesley Fast.² Through Lent. John Wesley would fast weekly, from Thursday after dinner until Friday dinner. Instead of breakfast and lunch on Fridays, Wesley would take the time to devote himself to prayer.

Whatever you choose to give up, or however you chose to mark this season, remember the purpose is to help us pay closer attention. Fasting reveals our hungers and the things we rely on, and it helps us pay attention to Christ's presence. The God who poured out his life for us in Jesus is with us in this time as always.



Lenten Study @ Noon on Wednesdays Beginning March 9 (March 16, the study will be on Thursday, March 17, instead)

Our theme this Lent is "Good Enough." It is based on a devotional with the same name by Kate Bowler and Jessica Richie. We live in a self-help culture that focuses on progress and personal development. We are constantly being sold a bill of goods about which products, or services, will make our lives better. We get anxious on social media when we perceive that everyone else but us is living their best lives now (eating better food, going more interesting places, doing things that are more fun). We vacillate between striving to reach new heights and feeling like we don't measure up.

Often, Lent produces a similar feeling from us. We either feel compelled by some grand vision of discipleship, or we bemoan the ways in which we fall short. But what if there were a way to create rhythms in our everyday life which will sustain us in our journeys with Jesus? What if instead of reaching for some impossible ideal, we looked for beauty and truth in what's possible for us? These are questions we will explore together through this season.



There are three ways we'd love for you to join the conversation:

- 1. Join us Sundays for worship as we explore these themes in worship.
- 2. Read *Good Enough: 40ish Devotionals for a Life of Imperfection* by Kate Bowler and Jessica Richie throughout this season.
- 3. Starting March 9th join us weekly on Wednesdays at noon for a soup lunch and Bible discussion group. This will be an informal Bible Study, and a chance to discuss what we are reading and learning together.

My prayer is that we will have a *good enough* Lent together, and that we will find a way to thrive in the life that Christ invites us into!

Pastor's Discretionary Fund

What is this fund?

- It is a fund used by the pastor to assist people in our community and our congregation with emergency needs not provided by other sources. We often partner with community services such as Klamath Basin Behavioral Health and Lutheran Community Services.
- Checks are made out to the business rather than the person requesting funds; i.e., Avista Utilities.

How is it funded?

- It is funded through our birthday offerings and special donations, outside of our operating budget.
- If you wish to make a donation to this fund, please mark it "Discretionary Fund" or "Outreach Fund."

Between February 1 and 24, we have given:

7 households 8 bags of food

On Souper Bowl Sunday we took in 35 cans, boxes, and bags of food and \$76 for our food pantry.

PALM Dinners Served

From January 30 to February 22: 589

Year to Date: 1,181

Average Meals Served: 74

PALM (Provide A Loving Meal) is a free dinner every Tuesday and Sunday from 5:00 to 6:30. It is located in the Fellowship Hall of the First United Methodist Church, which is the lower level door closest to 9th and High Streets.

PALM is a volunteer program. It is funded by your donations. The Klamath Falls First United Methodist Church provides the Fellowship Hall, some maintenance, and utilities.

PALM provides from 85 to 257 plates of food each meal. Families, neighborhood residents, and even people who simply want the social interaction of a meal come in. Most people walk.

Volunteers from the Methodist Church, colleges, other churches, and many others come together to help.

Please come and visit, eat, help in the kitchen, or donate.



Financial Report

MEMBERS and FRIENDS

February,2022 has closed. All bills and taxes have been paid. The monthly payroll was made. Operating income for the month totaled \$4,677.14 . Operating expenses totaled \$6,502. 05 . Income lagged expenses by \$1,824.91. In addition to payroll expenses (\$3,166.16), operating expenses included a budgeted payment of \$1,036.00 for Conference Apportionments. This represents the second of 12 payments toward the 2022 goal of \$12,422.00.

As we enter March 2022, we have an Operating Fund balance of \$131,806.09. However, a portion of these monies are contained in outside or side pocket funds which have nothing to do with budgeted operating monies. As of the first of March, six (6) such funds existed. The funds and their respective balances:

Youth Group: \$576.86 Organ: \$4,348.51 PALM dinners: \$9,843.21

Camperships: \$150.00 Memorial Fund: \$14,505.47

Special Needs Fund: \$45,645.20*

After subtracting out the total of the 6 funds (\$75,069.25), there is a carryover to March 2022 of actual OPERATING monies totaling \$56,736.84. Financially, for the near term outlook (2-5 years), we are in a weak position treading water at best. We entered 2022, with a carryover from 2021, totaling \$63,058.60. Because monthly income is anticipated to lag monthly expenses, the carryover will continue to erode. In the first two months, the carryover has eroded by 10%.

As of March, 2022, the Capital (Trustee) Fund Balance is \$6,636.44. For the present, we are no longer using the security service we employed throughout 2021. During the month, there was a bit of activity in this fund: The final payment (\$4,129.00, split evenly between this fund and PALM) was expended to Winema Electric for the installation of the new stove in the downstairs kitchen. Also, \$3,200 was expended for the deposit required by Seasons Change LLC, for the \$6,200.00 installation of two new gas heaters (one for the church office and one for the library. To fund all this, \$500.00 was deposited from the \$1,000.00 sale of the old downstairs stove (split evenly between this fund and PALM). Secondly, we closed out the PMF (Parsonage Maintenance Fund) Fund at KPEFCU (Klamath Public Employees Federal Credit Union) and

transferred in the balance to this fund (\$2,435.14). Finally a transfer of \$5,000.00 was made to this fund from the PMF at Edward Jones, leaving a balance of approximately \$90,000.00 there.

^{*}Please note the new "SPECIAL NEEDS" FUND. Recently, a long-time member generously contributed over \$45,000.00 to be used for Council approved expenditures. While there are "no strings attached," the fund is intended to be directed toward "special needs" of the church building as well as the community at large.

NEW STOVE INSTALLED IN DOWNSTAIRS KITCHEN

If you get a chance, drop by and view the beautiful new commercial stove (worth about \$10,000.00) given anonymously to the PALM program several months ago. It required both gas and electric hookups. Consequently, we contracted with Winema Electric to rewire the downstairs so as to carry a separate line dedicated to the stove only. Also, the gas line had to be rerouted to accommodate the installation. The total cost expended for the setup approached \$9,000.00, split nearly evenly between PALM and the Capital (Trustee) account. The anonymous doner



is to be graciously thanked. Don Dumbeck is to be thanked for his leadership in carrying out the entire installation as well as finding a buyer and seeing that the old stove was sold for \$1,000.00 (the proceeds split evenly between the PALM Fund and the Capital [Trustee] Fund). Our downstairs kitchen is now capable of many more years of community service.


