

"Livin' on a Prayer"

Sermon Series on The Lord's Prayer

June 26 - July 24

Pastor's Note

My grandparents lived on a farm in northern Alberta where I would spend many summer days when I was a kid. My nuclear family lived in the city, or the suburbs and it was in these summers where I got to experience more fully life on the land. My



grandparents were hay farmers and there were things for this city kid to explore on the farm and trouble to get into. I spent much of my time jumping between the roofs of the granaries and eating crab apples, chokecherries, saskatoons, and gooseberries from trees and shrubs I found around the homestead. But my favorite place was my grandmother's garden.

I remember it being as big as a football field. I don't know if that is a little kid size inflation, maybe if I saw it today, I wouldn't think it was quite that big, but the garden was big. My uncles and aunt assured it me that it used to be much bigger than that and what I was seeing was the pared down version. At one end of the garden was an unruly and sprawling raspberry patch, followed by strawberries. There were rows of corn, zucchini, cucumbers, beans, cabbage, peas, carrots, squash, pumpkins, watermelon, onions, potatoes, garlic, dill, tomatoes, and poppies and more I am forgetting. Each day my grandmother would be in this garden or in her flower beds weeding and watering and tending her plants. She would pick veggies for dinner or harvest a cabbage when its leaves were still tender enough to be rolled into Ukrainian cabbage rolls or unearth enough potatoes to make a pierogies.

I would wander into the garden whenever I was hungry, and I would graze! My fingers were stained red from eating raspberries and strawberries, and I would stand in the middle of the garden sucking young peas from their pods, or eating the ripe red tomatoes, or rattling the dry head of poppy plants and pouring the seeds encased inside into my mouth and crunching on them. Occasionally I would go and uproot a carrot and wash it off with the hose, or snack on the cucumbers and beans or zucchini.

I was welcome to go into that garden and pick and eat whatever I wanted. But no matter how much I filled my mouth with berries or peas, or poppies there was always more to have. My grandmother's basement was full of canning, and every freezer was full of freezer jams and frozen vegetables.

If someone dropped by for lunch, she could send me to get something and there was always something on hand to offer them. I wouldn't have called this sacred when I was younger, it was the ordinary joy I experienced during those summers on the farm, but as I think about it now, my grandmother's garden was an icon of God's abundance—a nourishing bounty that was always more than enough.

Ephesians 3:20 tells us that "God is able to do immeasurably more than we ask or imagine, according to the power that is at work within us." Too often the threat of scarcity keeps us from seeing the ways that God is at work in us. We worry about money and resources, and bills and the demands that are on our attention and our time. It is so easy to feel like we are not enough. And we are not. But God invites us into a garden where we can take and eat what we find there and find that we never diminish the bounty of good things God has in store for us. We operate out of scarcity, but God operates from abundance. Can we trust that what God has for us is always more than enough?

BASIN TRANSIT SERVICE SUNDAY ON-DEMAND SERVICE Starting July 10

A door-to-door service for Seniors and Individuals with disabilities and the general public when seating space is available.

- 1) Call Friday Schedule your pick-up times with their dispatcher at 541-883-2877 by calling between 8 am and 5 pm.
- 2) They pick you up at the place and time within BTS District Boundaries.
- 3) They drop you off at your destination. Cost is \$1.50 per ride and *FREE* with Klamath County Veterans Appreciation Card.
- 4) They take you back from the place and time you schedule.

Service begins Sunday, July 10 and runs from 8 am to 3 pm.

"Basin Transit Sunday Service is a pilot program to develop and understand Sunday's public transportation service need with emphasis on Seniors and Individuals with ADA qualifying disabilities and the general public on space available basis. The program will operate two paratransit vehicles 8 am to 4 pm on Sundays. Rides must call Friday between 8 am and 5 pm to schedule their Sunday rides. Pick up times need to be specific, "will call" cannot be accommodated for this service."

PALM Dinners Served

PALM (Provide A Loving Meal) is a free dinner every Tuesday and Sunday from 5:00 to 6:30. It is located in the Fellowship Hall of the First United Methodist Church, which is the lower level door closest to 9th and High Streets.

PALM is a volunteer program. It is funded by your donations. The Klamath Falls First United Methodist Church provides the Fellowship Hall, some maintenance, and utilities.

PALM provides from 85 to 257 plates of food each meal. Families, neighborhood residents, and even people who simply want the social interaction of a meal come in. Most people walk.

Volunteers from the Methodist Church, colleges, other churches, and many others come together to help.

Please come and visit, eat, help in the kitchen, or donate.



Financial Report

MEMBERS and FRIENDS

JUNE 2022 has closed. All bills and taxes have been paid. The monthly payroll was made. Operating income for the month totaled \$4,706.42. Operating expenses totaled \$9,619.02. Income lagged expenses by \$4,912.60. In addition to payroll expenses (\$3,159.39), operating expenses included a budgeted payment of \$1,036.00 for Conference Apportionments. This represents the sixth of 12 payments toward the 2022 goal of \$12,422.00. The 6 payments total \$6,216.00 (50.0% of goal). We also made a 6 month property insurance premium (\$3,433.50) covering the church and parsonage buildings. The month-to-month Operating balance dropped a whopping 9.57%.

As we enter July 2022 we have an Operating Fund balance of \$120,789.09. However, a portion of these monies are contained in outside, or side pocket, funds which have nothing to do with budgeted operating monies. As of the first of July, six (6) such funds existed. The funds and their respective balances:

Youth Group: \$576.86 Organ: \$4,348.51 PALM dinners: \$9,658.80

Camperships: \$150.00 Memorial Fund: \$14,005.47

Special Needs Fund: \$45,645.20*

*Please note the new "SPECIAL NEEDS" FUND. Recently, a long-time member generously contributed over \$45,000.00 to be used for Council approved expenditures. While there are "no strings attached," the fund is intended to be directed toward "special needs" of the church building as well as the community at large.

After subtracting out the total of the 6 funds (\$74,384.84) there is a carryover to July 2022 of actual OPERATING monies totaling \$46,404.25. Financially, for the near term outlook (2-5 years), we are in a weak position treading water at best. We entered 2022, with a carryover from 2021, totaling \$63,058.60. As of July 1st, the carryover has eroded 26.41%. Ongoing monthly income is anticipated to lag monthly expenses, and monthly carryover will continue to erode. Sometime late next year (2023), without a major cash infusion, I anticipate the carryover will disappear completely as we move into a negative balance.

As of July 2022 the Capital (Trustee) Fund Balance is: \$4,041.84. During the month, \$2,570.00 was expended to Outlaw Roofing to cover the balance of the Council approved newly roofed breezeway entrance from the parking lot to the downstairs Fellowship Hall.


