Pastor's Note

It was a sunny day at Veterans Park on Saturday, July 16, the day of the second annual Klamath Falls Pride festival. The previous year, our church had participated as the only visible Christian presence at the event. But that was last year, this year was different. This year, an Oregon State Representative led a prayer meeting before the event, out of concern for what Pride meant for our community. Another Christian group came with signs of protest and their own P.A. System where a man preached at the Pride gathering for about 4 hours straight (if you think I'm long-winded, you have no idea).

Fifty-feet-away, our church had a table. We had stickers with the United Methodist cross with a Rainbow flame, candy, and a sign with our church name and the UMC motto: Open Hearts, Open Minds, Open Doors. I wore a t-shirt with our logo on it, that read, "Break the rules, love everybody." For the five hours we were there, we would hear words of judgment hurled at our neighbors and we sought to embody a different form of Christian spirituality. One that spoke of love, and hospitality and welcome first, not words of judgment, rejection, and dismissal.

We didn't speak directly with the other Christians there, though I made eye contact and smiled a couple of times. Our role there was not to get into a shouting match with those we disagree with, but to share the love of Jesus. We had several good discussions with LGBTO folk who had a church, faith tradition they had left because, as they'd come to terms with their orientation or gender identity, they were no longer welcome in those spaces. Some would come to our table upset, having just talked to the other Christians on the sidelines, a few with complaints about how they were mistreated. We would listen, and we would remind people of Christ's love and acceptance of them.

Hearing the stories of our LGBTQ neighbors was a sacred moment for me and I was moved by the spiritual hunger the LGBTQ community has. I shared with people my conviction that the Bible tells us the story of God's redemption and love for people, and I would tell them,

"If anyone ever weaponizes the Scripture against you, you can be sure that they are reading God's story wrong." Mostly, people just appreciated that we were there. A lot of our LGBTQ neighbors only experience iudgment and exclusion from those of us in the church. Our church's presence at Pride told a different story, as we sought to honor each person's uniqueness and we approached them with genuine interest and love.

PALM stands for "Plan a Loving Meal" and for years the people planning, cooking, and coordinating volunteers have been Don and Vickie Dumbeck. The Dumbecks are uniquely gifted for this work. Vickie's kind heart and infectious joy has made PALM the welcoming environment it is. Don's concern and knowledge of the community has helped connect people to resources and services. They have been a gift to so many people! Alongside Vickie and Don, have been a team of committed volunteers who have cooked, cleaned, served meals, and laughed and swapped stories with our weekly dinner guests.

Recently, Don and Vickie realized they could not continue to run the PALM program and they made the difficult decision to step away. They both dearly love our weekly dinner guests, and they are sad that in their absence the program will not continue. And so are we. When I speak to people in the wider Klamath community and I mention our church's name, they usually respond to me with, "you are the church that does the meals!" PALM made a big difference in people's lives, both for our unhoused neighbors and for those in the community who had a hard time making ends meet. I hopeful that our church will continue to reach out and impact the community in positive and creative ways, but we don't want PALM to disappear without taking time to name and remember the ways that it has touched people's lives

Vickie and Don's last meal service for PALM will be August 16th, but we would like to invite everyone back on **Wednesday**, **August 17th**, **5:30-7pm for PALS**: Plan a Loving Send-off! This is a celebration of life service for a ministry that mattered! If you have volunteered, or

have come for dinner, or have been impacted by PALM in any way, come and share stories with us as we celebrate what God has done in and through Don and Vickie and our countless volunteers. God has used our little church community in some beautiful ways these past 15 years, and this is worth celebrating!

Pastor's Discretionary Fund

What is this fund?

PALM Dinners Served

There will be 1 more PALM dinner in the month of July.

PALM (Provide A Loving Meal) has been a free dinner every Tuesday and Sunday from 5:00 to 6:30. It is located in the Fellowship Hall of the First United Methodist Church, which is the lower level door closest to 9th and High Streets.

PALM is a volunteer program. It is funded by your donations. The Klamath Falls First United Methodist Church provides the Fellowship Hall, some maintenance, and utilities.

PALM provides from 85 to 257 plates of food each meal. Families, neighborhood residents, and even people who simply want the social interaction of a meal come in. Most people walk.

Volunteers from the Methodist Church, colleges, other churches, and many others come together to help.

Please come and visit, eat, help in the kitchen, or donate.



Financial Report

MEMBERS and FRIENDS

JULY 2022 has closed. All bills and taxes have been paid. The monthly payroll was made. Operating income for the month totaled \$4,940.58. Operating expenses totaled \$8,012.77. Income lagged expenses by \$3,072.19. In addition to payroll expenses (\$2,846.94), operating expenses included a budgeted payment of \$1,036.00 for Conference Apportionments. This represents the seventh of 12 payments toward the 2022 goal of \$12,422.00. The 7 payments total \$7,252.00 (58.3% of goal). We also made a 3-month mileage payment reimbursement to the Pastor for \$1,808.82. The month-to-month Operating balance dropped 6.62%.

As we enter August 2022, we have an Operating Fund balance of \$157,195.98. However, a portion of these monies are contained in outside or side pocket funds which have nothing to do with budgeted operating monies. As of the first of August, six (6) such funds existed. The funds and their respective balances:

Youth Group: \$576.86 Organ: \$4,348.51 PALM dinners: \$9,137.88

Camperships: \$150.00 Memorial Fund: \$14,005.47

Special Needs Fund: \$85,645.20 *

*Please note the "SPECIAL NEEDS" FUND. Some time ago, a long time member generously contributed over \$45,000.00 to be used for Council approved expenditures. While there are "no strings attached," the fund is intended to be directed toward "special needs" of the church building as well as the community at large. Recently, this very generous member contributed an additional \$40,000.00 for a current Fund balance of \$85,645.20.

After subtracting out the total of the 6 funds (\$113,863.92) there is a carryover to August 2022 of actual OPERATING monies totaling \$43,332.06. Financially, for the near term outlook (2-5 years), we are in a weak position treading water at best. We entered 2022 with a carryover from 2021 totaling \$63,058.60. As of July 1st, the carryover has eroded 31.28%. Ongoing monthly income is anticipated to lag monthly expenses, and monthly carryover will continue to erode. Sometime late next year (2023), without a major cash infusion, I anticipate the carryover will disappear completely as we move into a negative balance.

As of August, 2022, the Capital (Trustee) Fund Balance is: \$4,041.94.


